Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church is a Reconciling in Christ congregation.

An online livestream will be available for today's service, along with a recording for future reference. Search "Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church" on YouTube.

This congregation worships on the ancestral and contemporary homeland of the Coast Salish peoples. We recognize the profoundly sacred relationship that our Native siblings have with the land and ask for forgiveness for the ways we have violated that which is revered by them and sustains us all.

Restrooms are located on the sanctuary level just past the library. In addition to men's and women's rooms, there is an all-gender restroom that houses a changing table.

A staffed nursery is available for children. You'll find it on this same floor, through the library, down the long hallway on the left (just past the restrooms).

Children are always welcome in worship! In the narthex you will find build-your-own worship bags. Your children can spread out and play in the narthex (speakers in the narthex will allow you to worship from there) or bring the activities to your pew.

The Pray Ground is the space in the Narthex (lobby) for small children and their caretakers to participate in worship while remaining their authentic selves without the burden of feeling self-conscious. There are activity items in baskets under the table. Ask an usher for help with any of these options. You are welcome to be here, make noise, wiggle, and participate in the way that works best for you. *Ask an usher for help with any of these options. We want people of all ages to feel comfortable here!*

Offerings Your generous gifts sustain this faith community! The outreach programs, music, choirs, utilities and facility upkeep plus our wonderful staff and more. Many folks contribute a set monthly amount through a program called Simply Giving that facilitates donations from your checking account on whatever timeframe you desire and amount you designate. *We encourage everyone to consider using this, or a fee-less bank transfer, as it provides reliable monthly income for our budget.* Some folks request offering envelopes which can be put in the offering plate or mailed in. FIRST READING: ACTS 8:26-40

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, “Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.” (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, “Go over to this chariot and join it.” So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, “Do you understand what you are reading?”³¹He replied, “How can I, unless someone guides me?” And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

“Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter,
and like a lamb silent before its shearer,
so he does not open his mouth.

In his humiliation justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth.”

The eunuch asked Philip, “About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?” Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, “Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?” He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.


SECOND READING: 1 JOHN 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also. Holy Wisdom. Holy Word. **Thanks be to God.**

In 2015, as a congregation, we celebrated **100 Years on the Ridge**. That is, the 100th Anniversary of PRLC. Oh, the memories! For several years since then, we have been looking for a permanent space for the Archives. With support and encouragement from Nancy Winder, we now have a space! YEAH!! The archives room is now located on the 4th floor of our church building! I have a couple of folks to thank for making this a reality. First, to **David Roby** for finding new spaces for the items that had been stored in this room — and removing these items. Thanks also to the **BAG** (Building & Grounds) Committee, especially Joel Maier, for physically moving half of the archive boxes from a space next to the Food Bank (on the first floor) up to the new Archives room. This was accomplished two weeks ago. Fifty boxes were relocated! THANK YOU.
