Welcome Visitors

We welcome all who worship with us today. Here are some notes about our congregation and our facility to help you feel at home among us.

Nursery A staffed nursery is available for children from birth through age 5 on the sanctuary level down the hall past the drinking fountain. Please sign your child in and out of nursery care. Usually parents gather their children before communion so that they can come to the Table together. An usher will be glad to direct you. *(If you prefer to have your child with you in worship, but are worried that they might disturb the service, we also have a crying room upstairs in the balcony. You will be able to hear and see most of the service there.)*

Restrooms are located on the sanctuary level just past the library. In addition to Men's and Women's rooms there is also a Family room with a changing table.

Count Me In Form is that little slip of paper in your worship folder. We ask all worshipers to complete this each week. Special prayer requests may be made on the back of the form and if there are special "sign ups" you can do that on the back. Place it in the offering plate as it is circulated during the service.

Grace Station is an outreach of the church office available every Sunday morning. Office Manager Christina Bogar (or a volunteer) is there to provide information about our church and to receive information such as address, phone or email changes, prayer requests and news about illness or hospitalizations. Current newsletters and program information are located there. Look for the "check-in desk" in the church gathering area.

Join us again! We worship every Sunday in the summer at 8:30 and 10:00 a.m. and would be honored to have you join us for worship again, soon, and often.

All baptized Christians are called to share in Christ's ministry of love and service in the world. The church calls some of its baptized members for specific ministries, including the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. Since the time of the Apostles, this office has been entrusted to women and men called to be pastors in the church through prayer and the laying on of hands.

Today we mark anniversary celebrations for Pastor Al Bruck and Pastor Don Maier, who over 50 years ago responded to God's call and were set apart for this ministry. Pastors are often described as "shepherds" called to faithfully steward the flock. We give thanks to God for these pastors who have faithfully pointed to the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ.



There will be a reception in honor of Pastors Bruck and Maier in the narthex this morning at 11:00, after the second service.

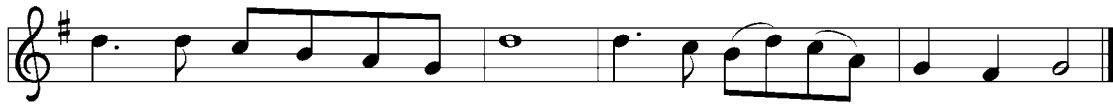

First Lesson: 1 Kings 3:5-12

At Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, "Ask what I should give you." And Solomon said, "You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart toward you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. And now, O LORD my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?"

Second Lesson: Romans 8:26-39

The Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified.

What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written,


“For your sake we are being killed all day long;

No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.



As you raised him from death to life, so send him again in our days to raise us up and gather us as his flock around your eternal throne.

Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.

Send now, we pray, your Holy Spirit, that this bread and this cup might be the body and blood of our shepherd Christ, that we might be renewed in spirit and find our fellowship among the saved.

Amen. Come, Holy Spirit.

With loving hand and guiding staff, keep us all on the path to righteousness until we are joined as one heavenly flock with the saints and angels of glory, where we will sing eternal praises in the presence of Christ our good shepherd. This is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Happy are they who are called to his supper.


O Christ, our Good Shepherd, be among us this day in the breaking of the bread and sharing of the cup.

If you prefer to receive a blessing instead of receiving communion, please come forward with your hand over your heart. Gluten-free wafers are available. If this is your need, ask the server.

Prayers and anointing for healing are offered in the Chapel, located directly across the communion table. If you would like to pray for yourself or others, confidentially for any need, the minister will pray with you. You may receive healing prayers before or after receiving communion.

This Morning We Celebrate 105 Years of Combined Ministry!

*This year marks the 50th Anniversary of Ordination for **Pastor Al Bruck** and the 55th for **Pastor Don Maier**.*

***Don** is +Bishop Emeritus of our Northwest Washington Synod, ELCA and former pastor here at PRLC. Don was ordained on August 26, 1962 at Grace Lutheran Church, Eugene, Oregon. His first call was serving as a missionary in Ghana. He then served St. Timothy Lutheran Church in Portland from 1970-1987. From 1988 to 1995, Don served as Lead Pastor at Phinney Ridge Lutheran Church. He was elected Bishop in 1995 and served until 2001. From 2002 to 2004, he served as the European Consultant in the ELCA Division of Global Missions. He also served for ten months as the Interim Bishop of Alaska.*

***Al** was ordained at Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Alameda, California, on July 16, 1967. Al has served two congregations: Gloria Dei Lutheran in Bellevue from 1967 to 1989; and St. Matthew Lutheran in Edmonds from 1990 to 2003. From 2004-2011, he was director of Spiritual Care at Miriam Hospital in Providence, Rhode Island.*

*We are pleased to welcome **Pastor Bev Piro** as our preacher today. Bev served as Associate Pastor here at PRLC from 1991 to 2012. Bev is a trusted friend and colleague of Pastors Bruck and Maier. They played a big role in her spiritual and pastoral formation.*

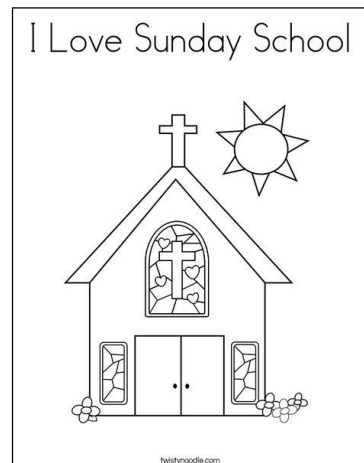
